4 Travel and Transportation Information

Below you will find information on how to access our facility. Many will find a rental car the best option for this event. A rental car will allow you to move more easily between your accommodation and the wind tunnel as well as give you lots of options for activities before, during and after the competition.

By Air

Brussels South Charleroi Airport (CRL)

Airspace Indoor Skydiving is located next to the Brussels South Charleroi Airport (CRL). The tunnel can be accessed by foot (20 minutes), taxi, car rental or via an on-demand shuttle to be booked directly with your hotel (fees may vary).

Brussels Airport (BRU)

The main International Airport in Belgium, Brussels Airport (BRU), is located 55 km from Airspace Indoor Skydiving. The tunnel can be accessed by taxi, car rental or via an on-demand shuttle to be booked directly with your hotel (fees may vary).

Buses and trains are alternatives that can take you from Brussels Airport to Charleroi, which is the closest city to Airspace Indoor Skydiving. To plan your travel please visit :

Road

Judges Travel and Accommodation

*A Sanction fee will be paid to the ISC by Airspace Indoor Skydiving in respect of all competitors, Heads of Delegation, Team Managers and Team Coaches listed on an Official Entry Form. According to The FAI Sporting Code Section 5 point 4.1.3. , the amount per person is determined by the ISC plenary in the year in which FCE takes place.

**If a competitor registers for more than one event the team fee will be discounted by 50€ per each already registered competitor for the additional event.

* Minimum Age for Junior Competitors

For the purpose of all indoor skydiving disciplines, a junior competitor is a person whose 13th birthday occurs either during or before the calendar year in which the relevant competition takes place and whose 18th birthday occurs either during or after the calendar year in which the relevant competition takes place.

Junior Performers, whose 15th birthday occurs during the calendar year of the competition may, if they choose, enter an open category event. Any competitor may only enter one category (Open or Junior).

**** Maximum number of teams.**

1. The Dynamic competitions are limited to a maximum of 32 national Performers/Teams.
2. Each NAC (National Airsport Control) is guaranteed the opportunity to participate with at least one national Performer/Team in the competition.
3. If the total number of represented NACs exceeds 32, then the system described below will be applied.
4. If the total number of represented NACs does not exceed 32, but the total number of Performers/Teams presented by all NACs exceeds 32, then, after ensuring universal representation, the remaining places will be allocated as described below.
5. The NACs must submit their Provisional Entry before the official deadline. Within The Provisional Entry, the NACs must list their Performers/Teams in the order of selection (The first Performer/Team to be selected must be placed in the position indicated as number 1)*. The NACs are required to submit certified results for every Performer/Team presented, in order to participate in the selection process. Under the supervision of the Organiser, the Dynamic Committee and the FAI Controller, in order to allocate the remaining places, consideration will be given to:
 - The official international ranking from the last World Championship (or World Cup), and/or
 - Results from national or regional competitions, based on times (final time, penalties included) certified by the NAC.

5.2 Procedure

Registration and payment for the 5th FAI World Indoor Skydiving Championships 2025 Artistic Events, will be conducted by the following procedure.

STEP 1: PROVISIONAL ENTRY (Deadline: February 9, 2025)*

Each NAC will receive the PROVISIONAL ENTRY FORM to fill out the required information of the performer(s)/team(s) representing their country.

STEP 2: PROVISIONAL ENTRY ACCEPTANCE

Once a complete form is received, the Organiser will initiate an e-mail communication with the contact person to confirm the provisional entry of the NAC. The Organiser must circulate the provisional entry list to all those NACs that have made a provisional entry not more than one week after the provisional entry deadline.

STEP 3: OFFICIAL ENTRY*

Based on the information submitted by the NAC, details will be sent via e-mail to each NAC to access the Official Entry form. The NAC must complete and send the Official Entry form to both the Organiser and the FAI Controller within the deadline. Once all details are completed, the NAC will be asked to complete the payment. An Invoice will be sent containing payment details.

Deadline for OFFICIAL ENTRY and payment: March 10, 2025

Should any changes be required to the number of teams or team members, the change can only be made by the NAC.

LATE REGISTRATION: After March 10, 2025

Any registration submitted after March 10 2025, may only be accepted if capacity allows it. The registration fee will be increased by 50%.

***Note to NACs:**

The name of the competitors on the entry forms must be EXACTLY the same as the one listed in the FAI Sporting License Database.

6 Event Facilities

Airspace Indoor Skydiving is designer-built for hosting big events. The building consists of two floors, specifically designed to draw your attention straight to the flight chamber. The facility includes an onsite restaurant, two changing rooms, a large conference room, two team rooms, a staff room as well as several office spaces that will be used for the competition staff. The space around the flight chamber is sufficiently large for both live judging and the audience.

The private parking that belongs to the tunnel can fit up to 75 cars. We also have an arrangement with a nearby hotel if further parking space should be needed.

7 Wind Tunnel Details

Airspace Indoor Skydiving opened in April 2014 and is an ISG (Indoor Skydiving Germany Group) design. The ISG design makes for arguably the smoothest airflow of any vertical wind tunnel. The wind tunnel is 17 meters high with a 14,7 feet wide by 5 meter high flight chamber in glass. The wind tunnel is able to operate at a maximum speed equivalent to 310 km/h. The airlock allows for entering and exiting from the wind tunnel without having to shut down the tunnel. The temperature of the air is regulated through an air exchange system with the outdoor environment. The facility does not overheat, apart from days with a very hot climate. This is rare for the period of the competition.

8 Pre-event Training

Airspace Indoor Skydiving wishes to give each team a fair possibility to book training time at the competition arena. Bookings until April 18 are unlimited. A maximum of 30 minutes of training time per team per day can be booked from April 19, 3 days prior to the start of the pre-competition training days* A delegation, group or athlete reserving big blocks of time must accept a minimum of one hour gap between each hour booked. This is to accommodate for as many athletes as possible to be able to fly in high demand timeslots. After the deadline of Official Entry, March 10, 2025, remaining free time will be sold at the organiser's discretion.

*April 22-23 are the pre-competition training days. Each team or freestyle performer, whose official registration duly reaches the Organiser of the competition before its official deadline, will have the opportunity, under the terms and conditions set by the organiser, to book a maximum of fifteen (15) minutes of training time between 8:00 and 24:00 pm (local time of the competition) to be performed within forty-eight (48) hours prior to Official Speed Setting Flights. The team must book this time with the Organiser before the official registration deadline. After the deadline the Organiser may offer the remaining time to anyone. Junior performers have priority between 08:00 and 18:00.

We ask for payments coming from outside the European Union to be done via TransferWise. Airspace does not accept booking cancellations on short notice. Any bank-, conversion- or credit card fees are to be covered by the buyer.

9 Accommodation



9.1 Van Der Valk - Hotel Charleroi Airport (★★★★★)

If you want to stay at the highest standard hotel close to Airspace Indoor Skydiving, Van Der Valk - Hotel Charleroi Airport would be your choice. The hotel is equipped with a parking, a nice restaurant, free Wi-Fi and a Fitness room. The hotel is located 7 km from the competition venue. The drive by car takes 10 minutes. A rental car is recommended.

9.2 Hotel Aero 44 Ibis Budget Styles (★★★★)

Within walking distance to our facility, the Aero 44 is an Ibis Styles hotel with an on-site restaurant, parking, free Wi-Fi and an on demand airport shuttle. This modern facility can also offer apartments (40 m²).



9.3 Ibis Budget Charleroi Airport (★★★)

If you wish to travel on a low budget, Ibis Budget Charleroi Airport is the option for you. The hotel is located within walking distance to both Airspace Indoor Skydiving and Brussels South Charleroi Airport. It has a modest café, free parking, Wi-Fi and can provide an airport shuttle.

10 Equipment

All competitors are required to wear a helmet and equipment which is in compliance with the FAI Sporting Code Section 5. Metal components and plastic mounts are strictly forbidden in the flight chamber whether on helmets or any other equipment, including shoes. Only shoes that do not make stripes on the glass will be allowed in the tunnel. Competitors need to bring their own weight belts. These weight belts are subject to inspection from Airspace Instructors. The purpose of this inspection is to ensure that no part of the belt could come loose during flight.

If the competitor enters the wind tunnel with exposed metal or plastic mounts despite warning, the organiser may hold him/her financially responsible for any damage to the wind tunnel equipment.

11 Music and video policy for Dynamic and Freestyle Athletes

The use of music in our sport has become foundational to artistic routines as well as general production of our events. As a result, we must act responsibly in respecting the music rights of the artists and writers who create the music. International Federations from all sports have had to address the use of copyrighted music in their events.

The ISC and Airspace Indoor Skydiving require all participating athletes to comply with copyright laws regarding performance and/or use of arrangements of copyrighted music as well as the use of copyrighted audio and spoken text. If copyright violation is found to exist, the athlete or team will not be able to perform to music.

In most cases, using musical selections to accompany a routine requires a license in order to comply with copyright law. Additionally, as we want to promote our sport online, we must ensure all athletes have licensed music.

Licensed music options include:

- Using original music: The athletes need to be able to prove that their music is bespoke.
- Using public domain music: Artists or composers deceased over 70 years ago.
- Using commercially released music: Either direct from the rights-holders or through a reputable service.

The ISC and Airspace Indoor Skydiving have partnered with a reputable music rights service, [ClicknClear](#) - a professional music industry licensing company with the backing of music industry rights holders. We encourage the athletes participating at WISC2025 to explore this resource and learn more about music rights and licenses.

Here are some key benefits for athletes, organisers and our sport as a whole:

- Athletes can obtain official music industry licenses at a pre-cleared affordable rate that is far lower than you could achieve individually (about 10-25€ per track).
- Athletes can download an official audio file.
- Legally create a music mix to accompany your routine, protecting yourself, the organiser and the sport as a whole.
- Videos of your routine using music purchased through ClicknClear may be uploaded onto Facebook and/or Youtube for non-commercial purposes. Videos will be subject to possible monetisation, blocking or takedowns by music rights holders through Facebook or Youtube advertising systems.
- When licensing from ClicknClear, additional online video rights to share your routines become available for further licensing by the ISC, Airspace Indoor Skydiving and other competition organisers which helps grow our sport.
- ClicknClear gives a legal indemnity with each license to their music.

11.1 About ClicknClear

Navigating global music rights can be an overwhelming task. ClicknClear has created a one-stop [online marketplace](#) where you can quickly and easily license music from a large and rapidly growing catalogue (currently 1.5M+ music titles) of great original music with all the rights you need to use in your sports mix, alongside your performances. ClicknClear has many genres of music, as well as music from around the world. You'll find tracks from iconic and current stars as well as up and coming artists and producers. When athletes license music from ClicknClear for their mix, The ISC and competition organisers are able to license the further online music rights we need to help popularise our sport and eliminate the need to mute video or live streams of performances.

Requirements for participation at WISC2025:

The ISC and Airspace Indoor Skydiving recommend purchasing your music through ClicknClear. All athletes using music must submit their Song Selection no later than 1 week before the start of the event (information will follow in Bulletin #2). Athletes failing to submit this information will not be permitted to compete with music. All competitors wishing to perform with music should bring their own music headsets. For Freestyle athletes, music duration must not be longer than 10 seconds over the routine's time*.

*Indoor Skydiving Competition Rules for Indoor Solo Freestyle 2024 Edition rule 2.8.

If you are unable to find the song you are looking for on ClicknClear, you may be able to make a request for a license. Please note, this can cost significantly more (10-20X), can take significantly longer to clear (weeks/months), and there is no guarantee that the request will get approved.

Any liability associated with unauthorised recordings will rest with the individual or organisation making the recording. The ISC and Airspace Indoor Skydiving do not condone, nor accept any liability for, any unauthorised recording during the event.

14 Judging and Scoring

Dynamr will be used as judging system for dynamic.

Either Intime or Competition Manager (pending validation from ISC judging committee) will be used as electronic scoring system to record the evaluation of the performance (AE and Dynamic).

15 FAI Judging Course In Dynamic

The FAI Judges Training Course in Dynamic will take place from 20-23 April 2025. Minimum number of participants to commence the course is 5 persons.

To participate in an ISC/FAI Judges Training Course you must fulfil the judge requirements specified in the FAI Sporting Code - Section 5 point 6.1.2 and specifically for Dynamic either:

“(i) have a valid DY National Judge rating or (ii) have the required DY experience (as defined below). In such a case, the candidate, with his NAC’s approval, will also have to attend and pass a pre-Training Course. For that purpose, an ISC Judge pre-Training Course Coordinator is appointed by the ISC Judges Committee from the members of the Dynamic Committee. Such a pre-Training Course must evaluate the candidates ability to meet the ISC’s minimum requirements. In order to demonstrate the “required DY experience” a candidate must: (a) have judged or have acted as Judge-in-Training (as per 6.7.6) in a minimum of two (2) competitions (FCE, SCE, national) in Dynamic 2-Way or Dynamic 4-Way within the last four (4) years. This experience must be confirmed in writing by the relevant Organisers or FAI Judges before attending the pre-Training Course. After attending the pre-Training Course, this experience must be recorded in the judging logbook before attending the ISC Judge Training Course in order to comply with the prerequisites of 6.2.1(3), and (b) have participated as a Performer, either: (i) in at least two (2) competitions in Dynamic 2-Way or Dynamic 4-Way conducted under the authority granted by the FAI/ISC (FCE or SCE), within the last five (5) years, or (ii) in at least three (3) national competitions in Dynamic 2-Way or Dynamic 4-Way where the applicable ISC competition rules have been strictly applied, within the last five (5) years. For this purpose, the term “national competitions” in (a) and (b(ii)) means one designated as such by the sport governing body of a particular country. The burden of proof rests on the person alleging compliance with one of the conditions listed above”.

Registration:

Step 1: Your NAC must approve and register you for the FAI Judges Training Course with a mail to Zeljko Tanaskovic : zeljko@zeltan.org and Airspace Indoor Skydiving : havard@airspace.be

Step 2: Scan the pages of your judges logbook from the past two years to prove your judging activities in the relevant discipline and send it to Zeljko Tanaskovic : zeljko@zeltan.org

Payment of the judges’ course will be by invoice once the entry has been accepted.

Price: The price per trainee is 180€. This price is to cover transportation, accommodation and food for the Chief Judge of Training for the duration of the course. The trainee is responsible for his or her own transportation, accommodation and food during the course. To cut costs we advise flying to Brussels South Charleroi Airport which is next to Airspace Indoor Skydiving. Find information regarding hotels under accommodation information. If the judge in training is interested in having a role in the judging staff for WISC2025 AE (example Assistant to CJ), he or her is encouraged to reach out to the Event Organiser.

Deadline for Final Registration and payment is March 10, 2025

16 Medical / Emergency Details

Airspace Indoor Skydiving does not request any flyer to hold third party liability insurance, however it is advisable to hold valid insurance. Any injury or damage is the responsibility of the participant.

Each participant entering the tunnel to fly will have to sign the Airspace Indoor Skydiving waiver document. Participants are responsible for covering their own repatriation and personal medical insurance for the duration of the stay for the competition.

Any damage at the accommodation facility, ceremony venues, lounges, etc is the responsibility of the person(s) involved.

Personal belongings are the responsibility of each person.

21 FAI Sporting Licenses

A valid FAI Sporting License for 2025 is required and must be obtained through the competitor's NAC. All competitors must be registered by their NAC in the FAI Sporting License Database <https://www.fai.org/sporting-licenses> before submitting the Official Entry Form to the Organiser. The name of the competitors on the entry forms must be EXACTLY the same as the one listed in the FAI Sporting License Database.

22 Other Matters

22.1 IBDs (Interim Bureau decisions)

IBD no. 2024-08 (11/06/2024):

The Bureau unanimously agreed to approve the new modified schedule for the 5th FAI World Indoor Skydiving AE Championships 2025, Airspace, Charleroi, BEL from the 22nd to the 28th of April 2025.

IBD no. 2024-15 (20/10/2024):

The ISC Bureau unanimously decided to approve the requested rule change to point 5.5.2 of the Indoor Skydiving Solo Speed Competition Rules 2024 edition with immediate effect.

NEW RULE:

5.5.2 Each battle will consist of one flight except for Finals (placings 1,2,3 and 4). For Finals, each battle will consist of two flights, each flight having its own draw. The final time is the sum of the times of the two flights, after all penalties have been applied. The Competitor with the fastest final time will win the Battle. In case of equal final times, the placings will be determined according to the number of penalties accrued during the two flights. The Competitor with the fewest penalties will earn the higher placing. In case of equal number of penalties, the Competitor(s) with the fastest time in the first round of the Qualification will earn the higher placing.

22.2 Camera angles

Camera angle used to judge free routines (Freestyle and Dynamic):

Free routines will be judged using the centre line camera angle, same as during WCIS/EISC 2022. To achieve a high score the athletes should strive to remain in view, meaning their whole bodies must remain within the 5-meter-high flight chamber in glass.

22.3 Flags, anthems and uniforms

All delegations must bring their own National flag (approximately 100 cm x 150 cm). The stated size of National flags must be respected. All delegations must bring their own National anthem in a downloadable format (CD, MP4) to be used in ceremonies. Official team uniforms are always encouraged.
